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ABOUT APIAHiP

Asian and Pacific Islander Americans in Historic Preservation (APIAHiP) is a volunteer-based nonprofit dedicated to leading in the preservation and awareness of Asian and Pacific Islander American historic sites and heritage across the United States and its territories. Since our founding in 2007, APIAHiP has worked to create greater awareness of historic sites and cultural resources significant to Asian and Pacific Islander Americans (APIAs) with advocacy efforts and educational programs, while building a vast network of supporters.

APIAHiP's mission is to protect historic places and cultural resources significant to Asian and Pacific Islander Americans through historic preservation and heritage conservation by: (1) creating an information-sharing network that supports established and emerging historic preservation programs, and contributes to defining issues; (2) establishing educational programs to raise public awareness and impact historic preservation policy on local, state, and national levels; and (3) increasing public and private resources for building historic preservation capacity. The term "historic preservation" and "heritage conservation" are meant to include educational and community development activities involving the preservation, conservation, and protection of tangible and intangible historic and cultural resources.

APIAHiP was created in 2007 when Asian and Pacific Islanders Americans noticed a lack of APIA representation at state and national preservation meetings. In response, key founders developed an API Caucus at the National Trust for Historic Preservation's annual conference. In June 2010, the API Caucus developed and hosted the first Asian Pacific Islander American National Historic Preservation Forum in San Francisco, California. The first Forum brought people together from communities across the nation and in US territories to share their issues and approaches to preservation. We have continued to organize a Forum every other year in Los Angeles (2012), Washington, DC (2014), Stockton (2016), and San Francisco (2018)

APIAHiP engages advocacy, research, and resource sharing through several platforms and initiatives. It maintains a national crowd-sourced mapping project, "East at Main Street," which features APIA historic sites and cultural resources. It has developed a Preservation in Action toolkit to support sites that are threatened, sites nominated for landmark designation, and preservation-related funding for nominations, technical support, and research. People from the APIAHiP network serve on advisory boards and support preservation policy and planning efforts, notably the National Park Service's AAPI Heritage Initiative and Theme Study, and the City of Los Angeles's Asian American context statement, and the State of Califorina's AAPI context statement.

We hope you enjoy the educational panels, tours of historic sites and neighborhoods, film screenings, and group discussions about the diverse stories of APIAs in the Pacific Region as they tell our diverse, layered stories of US history.

We look forward to learning more about stories, people, and places here in Hawai'i as they may inspire us to envision the future of historic preservation not only for Asian and Pacific Islander Americans, but for all Americans.

- Located at 2454 South Beretania Street in Mōʻiliʻili, the Cultural Center features a Community and Historical Gallery, Resource Center, Kenshikan martial arts dōjō, Seikōan Japanese teahouse and Gift Shop. The Cultural Center presents various programs, festivals, and exhibitions throughout the year.
- The Honouliuli Education Center, located in the JCCH Community Gallery in Mōʻiliʻili, is open Monday through Saturday and is free to the public. The Honouliuli Education Center showcases photos of Honouliuli Internment Camp, artifacts from the internees, oral history videos, and virtual tours of the Honouliuli National Historic Site. For those who cannot visit in person, JCCH also has an online, searchable directory of the internees from Hawaiʻi at https://interneedirectory.jcch.com.
- The JCCH presents Okage Sama De: I am what I am because of you, an exhibition that tells a cultural story that resonates with all ethnicities across the United States. The exhibit reveals the indelible legacies and values passed on from generation to generation—starting with the first wave of Japanese immigrants in 1868—that are now weaved into the Hawai'i landscape and still carried on today.
